GEORGES DUMITRESCO - ROMANIA

Georges Dumitresco was born in Bucharest in 1922 and has lived in Switzerland since 1969. A distinguished scholar, man of letters, philosopher, artist and medical doctor, he was named Man of the Year in 2001 by the American Biographical Institute, and Doctor of Writing in 2000. Dumitresco is a Member of the *Association vaudoise des écrivains*, the *Fédération internationale des écrivains de langue française*, the *Association des écrivains roumains* and the *Union mondiale des écrivains médecins (UMEM)*.

His work has been the subject of many articles and publications. In 1956, he founded the Ion Tuculescu group of doctor artists, he also founded the *Jura artistique* (Vallorbe, 1978-2002). He has published several collections of poems: the most recent, a three-language volume in Romanian, French and Italian, is entitled *Triptyque* and contains 142 poems and 80 illustrations.
